Marine parade a crowd pleaser

Top winner makes a bridge to past

Music, memories, flowers and floats graced Commencement Bay yesterday and "Galloping Gertie" came through a winner in the 33rd annual Daffodil Festival Marine Parade.

Some observers thought the replica of the old Narrows Bridge, carried by two boats tethered together, might fall victim to wind and water as did the original some 40 years ago. But this Gertie, entered by the Tacoma Yacht Club, survived the parade course without wetting a petal of the 25,000 fodils that adorned it.

the imaginative, 65-foot-long creation maneuvered by Skippers Gus Lange and Paul Ericson captured the Sweepstakes Award, signifying the best in the entire parade, which carried out the Festival theme, "Golden Memories."

The Commodore's Award, given for the second-best float, went to the Yarrow Bay Yacht Club of Seattle.

Using 17,000 daffodils, the runner-up featured memories of youth, with an animated clown, toys and an old-time radio that sent sounds of the past rolling

across the waves to audiences along the shore.

Grand Marshal Joe Devish of Puyallup claimed no prizes, but his boat blossomed anyway with Daffodil Queen Jeanene Dryer and several princesses aboard.

One of Tacoma's new fireboats, with sirens sounding, signaled the start of the parade and led the way from the Tacoma Yacht Club basin to Old Town Dock.

Among those watching the festivities from the Tacoma Yacht Club were visitors who came on 150 boats from surrounding communities.


Judges picked the Seattle Yacht Club's "Mosquito Fleet" entry, with its 17,000 daffodils fashioned to represent one of the ships that plied Puget Sound in days gone by, as winner of the Daffodil Marine Award for the best marine-related portrayal.

Parade directors radioed skippers to keep their floats close to shore as they approached Old Town Dock, bringing the intricacy of craftsmanship, innovation of design — and animation — into full focus.

Stacks of the floral vessels belched smoke, whistles tooted, music wafted across the water.

And people cheered.









50 Years of Golden Memories 1933 • 1983



The Daffodil Festival began in 1933 as a modest tribute to the valley's flower industry. Today, 50 years later, the festival is the third largest floral festival in the country and Pierce County's annual rite of spring celebration.

Daffodils were first grown in the Puyallup Valley in the early Twenties following the demise from an infestation of the lucrative hop industry. The area's mild climate and rich soil have combined to transform the valley into the "bulb basket" of the nation. Valley growers produce approximately 80 percent of the nation's tulips and over 50 percent each of bulb iris and daffodil bulbs. About 300 varieties of daffodils alone are grown here, with the King Alfred the most popular and plentiful.

The festival is a potpourri of large and small events for young and old alike, most conducted during Festival Week. The chief event and the festival's hallmark is the Grand Floral Street Parade—a four-city affair comprised of scores of floats, marching bands, mounted units and other participants. Among numerous other festival events are a Junior Parade for children, Most Magnificent Mutt Show, Daffodil Flower Show, Marine Parade, 10 Kilometer Daffodil Run and Daffodil Drag Boat Race. Reigning over the festival are a queen and royal court of daffodil princesses selected from 21 area high schools.

Who aponsors and conducts the festival? You do. The Daffodil Festival, Inc. is a non-profit corporation governed by a 50-member board of directors and supported by thousands of community volunteers. Only two full-time paid staff personnel are retained. The greatest share of festival financing-about 35 percent-is derived from individual and business memberships. And it's a good investment. The festival promotes a sense of community identity and civic pride. It provides family fun for thousands of local and visiting participants and spectators. And it each year returns millions of dollars to the local business community from festival-related events and activities.
