
















1992 DAFFODIL PARTY, SHOW & DANCE Friday, April 10th

The venerable 72-foot schooner Red Jacket, on its first outing following repairs necessitated by a "ghost" cruise during the December 1990 storm, was decorated and manned by the Tacoma Women's Sailing Association. Jodges gave it the Boating Fun Award. Sea Explorer Scouts entered conter, the Charles N. Curtik, to place first in the commercial divinion, although it technically is not a commercial vessel. Point Defiance Shop Rite was second, with Radio KJUN third.

Three classic cruisers, the Mitlite, Paramar and Roanoake from the Classic Yacht Association, were given awards of excellence. Similar awards were given to Rainier Yacht Club and the charter vessel Silver Swan.

Special merit awards went to an Army National Guard landing craft and the county-owned and operated ferry Stellacoom, which had been chartered for the parade by The Morning News Tribune.

A Coast Guard cutter led the nautical procession, but the first boat to actually start the parade was that of Barbara Allen, parade marshal, who has been an active member of the Tacoma Yacht Club since 1974, a past president of Shipmates and chairman of various committees.

Profile of '95 Daffodil Regatta Flag Boat Skipper Bill Brasier

Bill joined the Tacoma Yacht Club in 1947 as the proud owner of an 18' flattie sailboat. Three years later he bought a 49' 8 meter and, with the help of Bill Nelson, Sr., learned how to sail and race a boat. The next 45 years saw him purchase nine other sailboats in the 45'-60' range.

Bill observed, "Sailboats have always been my 'Achilles Heel'", As was in the late 1950's when he commissioned a yard to build a 58' yawl, Sabrina. After her brief ownership, there followed seven more sailboats: one from Seattle, two from San Francisco, one from Annapolis, Md, one from Stockholm, Sweden, and two others from the East Coast. Bill had the adventure of sailing the later two through the Panama Canal and with crew changes finally arrived at TYC. One of these was the 57' yawl, Temptation, that he sold a third interest in to Bill Nelson, Jr. and a third to Alan Buchan, both of this Club. Before selling Temptation in 1975, the trio raced her to Maui, after which the tripartnership ended.

Bill Nelson, Jr. has had 3 or 4 boats since and is now campaigning the super-light speedster, "Bondi Tram". After 6 years of sailing his yacht, "St. Coombs", around the world, Alan Buchan has purchased and converted a 70' Scottish fishing boat. He left Scotland Summer, 1994 and, as you read this, he should have rounded Cape Horn and be sailing up the Chilian Coast of South America.

Bill believes his favorite boat was "Typon", a Swan 47'. She was purchased in Stockholm in 1981, and with the help of three TYC members and their spouses (Judy and Louis Mercille, Joanne and Cal Bamford, and Dorothy and Terry Webster), cruised through Scandinavia and Northern Germany. Weyerhaeuser Shipping Co. picked her up in Bremen, Germany and shipped her to Tacoma.

I suppose if you have raced for forty-five years you are bound to win now and again. In 1965, "Kialoa I", a 52' sloop, earned a 2nd Overall in Canada's Swiftsure race. This vessel also brought Bill safely home from San Francisco through the 1963 Columbus Day Storm, where he was caught in 90 knot winds off Cape Mendicino and clocked 6 knots with bare poles.

"While racing sailboats has always been a great joy, I must admit after forty-five years, cruising is beginning to sound better all the time."

Nelson's 41' Australian built Frers sailboat, "Bondi Tram" will set the procession pace of this year's parade of floral floats and boats.



































THE DAFFODIL FESTIVAL FACT SHEET

1999-2000

History of Bulb Industry

Daffodils came to the Puyallup Valley about 1925 to replace the area's dying hop industry. The U.S. Department of Agriculture recommended bulb growing because of the area's excellent soil and ideal climate. About 200 varieties of Daffodils are grown with King Alfred the best known and most locally grown.

In recent years, the industry has found a lucrative market in cut flowers, each year selling more than 15 million Daffodil buds, 6 million Tulip buds and one million Iris buds.

Origin Of Festival

The Puyallup Valley Daffodil Festival to all intents and purposes was born on April 6, 1926 when Mr. and Mrs. Charles W. Orton were hosts to civic leaders from 15 towns in Western Washington at their rural Sumner home for a garden party, arranged so the guests could see the many varieties of daffodils in bloom. Among the guests were the mayors from Seattle and Tacoma. Major General Robert Alexander, commander at Fort Lewis, brought a military band and a group of officers and their ladies from the Army post. After the first garden party, the event became an annual affair.

Year after year, interest grew, (along with the ever expanding daffodils) until 1932, at which time "Bulb Sunday" came into being. The viewing of daffodils in bloom became fashionable, and, unfortunately created a **massive traffic problem** for Puyallup, Sumner and Orting, as up to 8,000 vehicles crowded the roads bordering the golden fields. No doubt, automobiles and owners were also vying for attention. The calamity of this congestion also brought a halt to "Bulb Sunday".

1934 was to become "*Parade*" year. Well known Tacoma photographer and first secretary of the founding group, Lee Merrill, suggested that the daffodil blooms, which at that time were thrown away or used as fertilizer be used instead as decoration for a Festival Parade. Automobiles were decorated with the daffodils, bicycles followed in like fashion and together paraded through our city and neighboring Valley towns. The presence of a mounted contingent of the finest riding horses in the area, prompted their appearance each year to follow. The idea grew and presently four Pierce County communities participate in the Festival -- Tacoma, Puyallup, Sumner, Orting .

In 1999 the Festival will be 66 years old, and there has been a parade every year since 1934, with the exception of the war years of 1943, 1944, and 1945.

Organization



The Daffodil Festival Board of Directors was formed in 1934, comprised of volunteers from the area's business community. They were charged with the responsibility of conducting the business of the Daffodil Festival, putting on Festival special events, providing the financial base and assuming all Festival financial obligations.

A host group was formed in 1965 known as the Daffodilians. They were a group of couples organized as the official Hosting and Visitation unit of the Daffodil Festival. They serve as honor guard for the Queen and the Royal Float.

October of 1996 the Board of Directors and Daffodilians combined to form a new group to be known as Daffodil Festival - Daffodilians. The new group is comprised of over 100 volunteers dedicated to making the 66th edition of the Daffodil Festival bigger and better than ever before.

Royalty Program

The Royal Court for the Daffodil Festival is comprised of 19 Princesses. Each girl is a senior from one of the 19 participating Pierce County high schools. The girls vie for various educational scholarships and for the title Queen of the Daffodil Festival. Princesses are Festival representatives to community organizations throughout the Festival season. A Queen Mother, assisted by chaperons, is in charge of the visitation program.

Queen's Coronation

Starting in September, preparation is begun, involving hundreds of individuals. Each of the 19 schools involved hold selections, in most cases, with a public invited program involving much of the school student body. One princess candidate is selected and a reception is given by the Daffodilians. Once a candidate is chosen they are encouraged to attend the selections at other schools.

January will find the princesses beginning a round of activity that is hectic, but exciting, Saturday rehearsals are under way. Public appearances become more numerous as more people receive the story of our Daffodil Festival.

For many years the Coronation has been held on Monday evenings in Tacoma. In 1997 it returned to the Valley and on Sunday with the hope of generating more audience participation. It was a successful move. The 1999 Coronation will take place Friday evening, March 19 at the Calvary Community Church in Sumner.

Queen's Coronation (cont.)



Judges are chosen several months in advance by the Festival President. They then begin observing the Queen candidates to ensure the selection is based on more than just one night's appearance.

Candidates are judged on the following: Academic Standing, Personality, Attitude, Speaking Ability, Appearance, Sociability, Content, Festival Awareness, Impromptu Speaking.

Grand Floral Street Parade

The Grand Floral Street Parade held most often on the second or third Saturday of April is the highlight of Festival Week. Traveling through four cities, the parade consists of approximately 40 float entries and over 80 other entries including bands and marching and mounted units. There are also some special units. A Grand Marshal is selected to lead the Parade. Floats are decorated with fresh-cut Daffodils, numbering in the thousands. The Daffodil Parade is among the largest floral parades in the nation.

The Daffodil Festival Traveling Float

The Daffodil Festival is a reciprocating festival, i.e. sending a float to other festivals that had participated in our own parade of floats. After our Festival our float becomes 'The **Daffodil Festival Traveling Float'.** Floats are transported by truck-trailer to out-of-town festivals to advertise our own yearly Daffodil Festival and, of course, to thank them for their participation in our major event. The Daffodil Queen and two Princesses always ride one of the floats at these events. Should more than one parade occur on a particular week-end, then two Princesses of the Royal Court will appear in that parade, usually in a vintage automobile, representing her at that particular event. The Royal Court, along with the traveling float, carry the story of King Alfred and the Daffodil Festival throughout the entire Pacific Northwest.

Junior Parade

The Junior Parade, the second major event of the Daffodil Festival, takes place a week or two prior to the Grand Floral Parade. 1999 will be the 38th annual Junior Parade. The Junior Parade begins at 10:00 a.m., and is hosted by the Proctor District. Costumes, pets, music and non-motorized floats are all part of this event. The first parade held in 1962 involved 400 participants, in 1999 it should exceed 3000. This event is geared to children, and encourages fun, creativity and partnership for the young people of the area.

Marine Parade



The Tacoma Yacht Club sponsors the Marine Daffodil Parade. The parade will start off the end of the Yacht Club breakwater at 12:30 and proceed along the waterfront past the Old Town dock, continuing to the Thea Foss Waterway. The decorated entries are judged and awards are presented.

Most Magnificent Mutt Show

Be advised that this contest is open to CANINES ONLY, no look-a-likes. No cats, rats, koalas, raccoons, 'possums or 'gators....juuuuuuuuuuust dogs. There are no fees to enter your pet, however registration is limited to girls and boys up to the age of fourteen. The winning contestant will be a V.I.M. (or <u>Very Important Mutt</u>) in the Junior Daffodil Parade. Categories consist of the Longest Tail, Most spots, owner-pet look alike, and finally the MOST MAGNIFICENT MUTT.

Booster Button

Each year a booster button is designed illustrating the theme of the Daffodil Festival for that year and is sold for \$2.00. A major fund raiser for the Festival, these buttons are sold at businesses throughout Pierce County. The Royal Court also sells the booster buttons are part of their visitation to Civic Clubs in the area.

Patron and Sustaining Memberships

No event the size of the Daffodil Festival can be staged without money. A most important source of income for the Daffodil Festival is the sale of Patron Memberships. The wearers of the Patron Button are the backbone of the Festival...theirs is the real contribution in dollars to make possible the activities of hundreds of volunteer supporters. Without their help, such events as the Coronation of the Queen, suitable costumes for the court, promotion of the Festival, and the Pierce Country cities of Tacoma, Puyallup, Sumner and Orting could not be easily and successfully arranged. But, more important than that, is the personal knowledge that each and every Patron Member is important and necessary for the success of the Daffodil Festival. You can swell with pride over the Festival without a Patron button, but it's more fun when you have the satisfaction of knowing 'your dough helps put on the show!'

King Alfred Club



This program was introduced in 1997 by then Sir Boss Mike Kelley and Lady Kathy. The King Alfred Daffodil, known for its predominance and strength, has been selected as the symbol of the Festival Sponsorship Club. We encourage many Pierce County business and community leaders to help us give the Daffodil Festival a secure future by taking a major role in our overall patronage. At present there are two categories: King Alfred Gold, \$1,000 per year for three years; King Alfred Bronze, \$500 for three years.

Civic Pride

Our Pierce County Community has for 65 years viewed the Daffodil Festival as the premier headline event, second only to the Western Washington Fair. Every other major city in Washington State has a Festival and we in the community should be proud that the Daffodil Festival continues to be a significant event.

Objectives

- TO focus national and regional attention on our local area as a place to live and visit
 - TO give citizens of the Valley and of Tacoma a civic endeavor to "rally 'round", fostering civic pride in our advantages.
 - TO give young people and organizations of the local area an opportunity to display their talents and abilities and to give vent to their enthusiasm in parades, pageantry and events.
 - TO stimulate the business economy through expenditures by and for the Festival and by visitors attracted during Festival Week.
